

















































אָנְוּר Agur בּן־יבָּה

Agur ("to collect") is the author of this Proverb. **Solomon** (aka Koheleth ("preacher", "assembler")) collected wise ("dark) sayings.

Jakeh ("carefully religious," "obedient," or "pious") was the father of Agur (Solomon), and would thus be **David**.

"Even the prophecy the man spake": the Hebrew is ha massa (the burden) ne'um (oracle or prophecy) ha-gebber (the mighty)

Ithiel, "God comes, arrives, is with me;" is equivalent to Immanuel, "God with us," a name of **Jesus**.

Ucal seems to be a verb, `ukhal, which means "to be consumed."

PaRDeS example: Sod in Proverbs 30:1

The words of Agur the son of Jakeh, even the prophecy: the man spake unto Ithiel, even unto Ithiel and Ucal,

Substituting names and words from our simplistic translation, we see a possible Messanic allusion:

The words gathered of the wise son of the pious father, the burden of the mighty prophecy, that El (God) arrives to be consumed.

This has several levels of deeper meaning:

- It can refer to the suffering and death of Jesus on the Cross.
- It can refer to Jesus' Bread of Life discourse in John 6:51.

Can you think of any other possibilities?
